make paper planes.

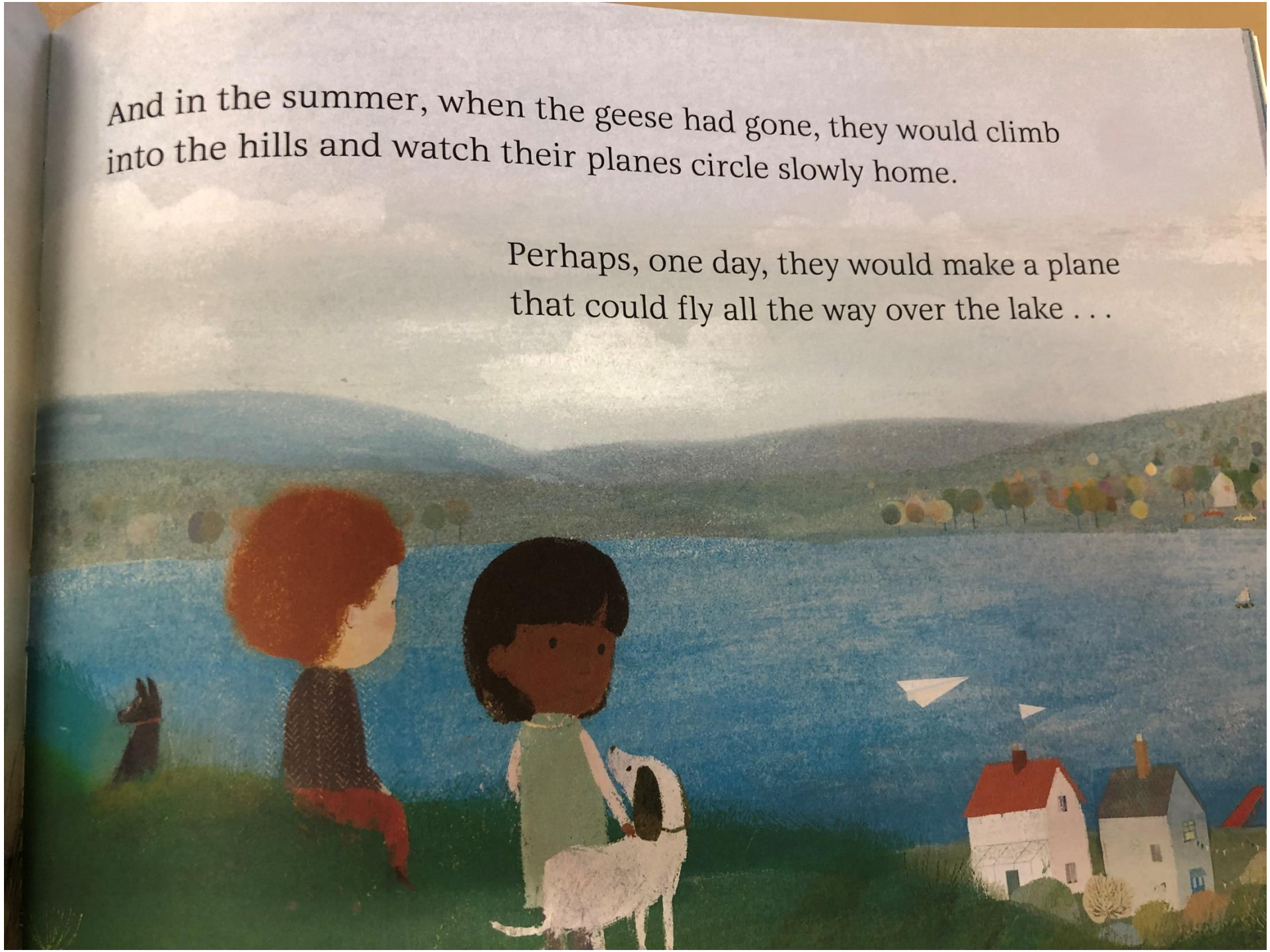


In the winter, when geese flocked to the lake,

How could they stay best friends if they were so far apart?

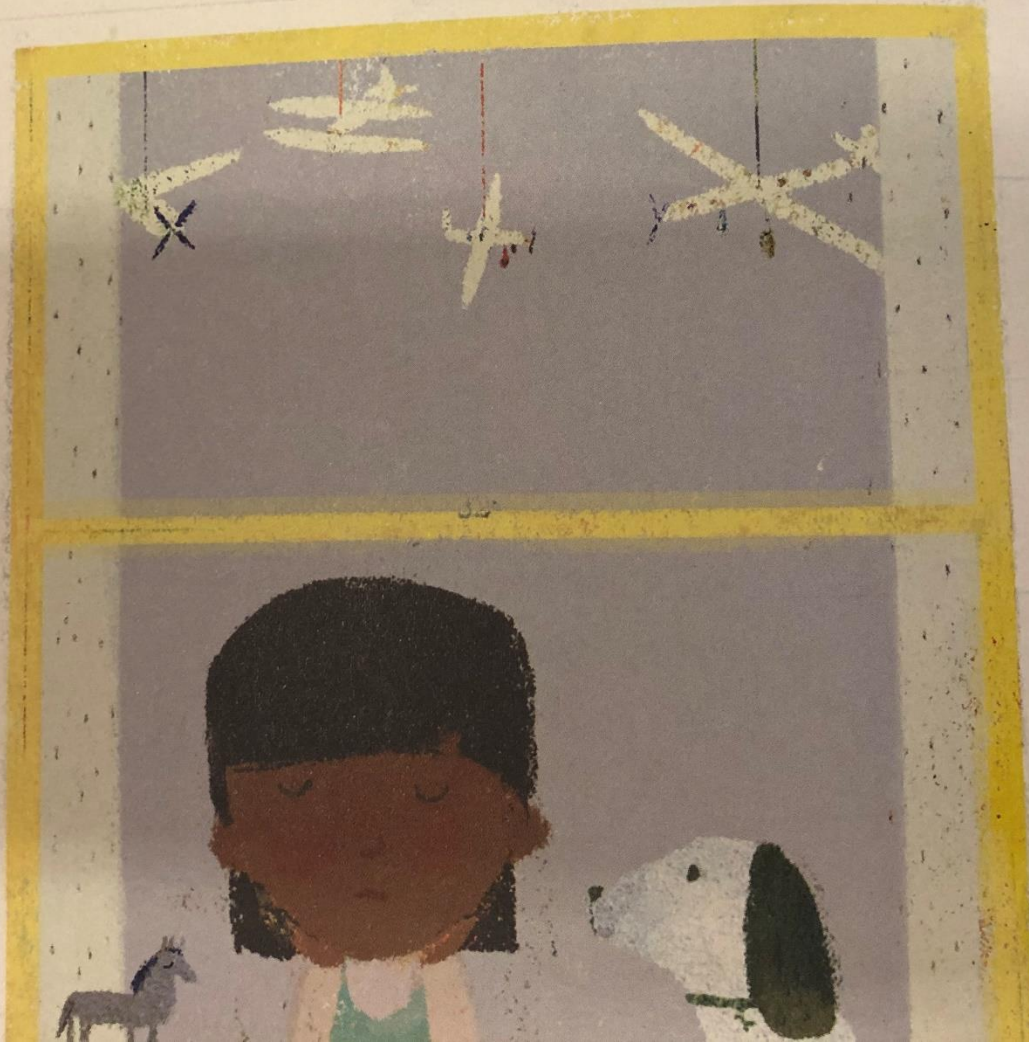
They promised never

calling and the beat of powerful wings.

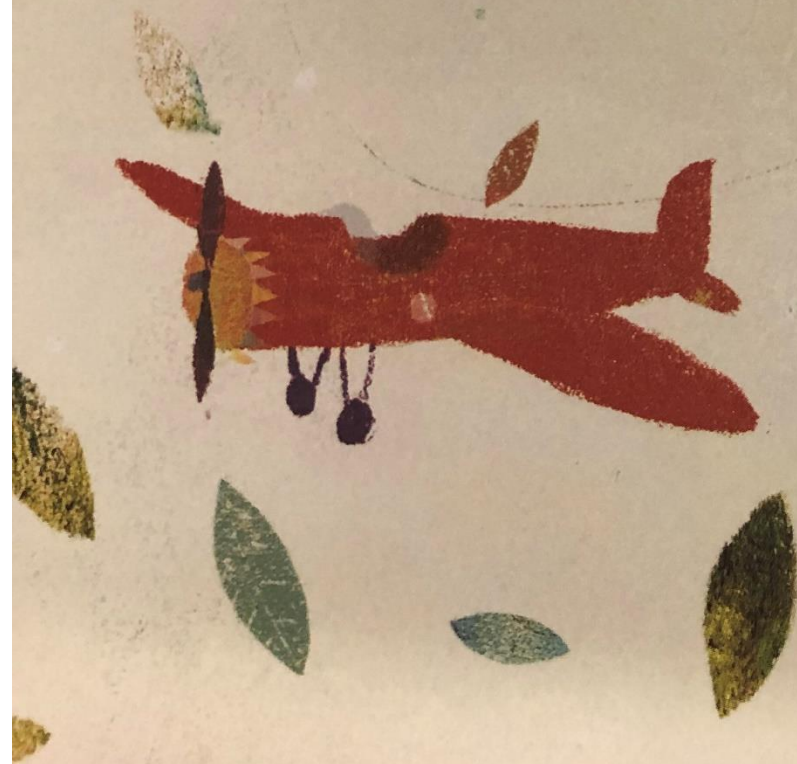


Down in the garden, she spied the broken plane,


Soon it was large enough

The two pilots flew fearlessly together . . .


swooping and

but as the sun began to rise, she knew it was time to go.

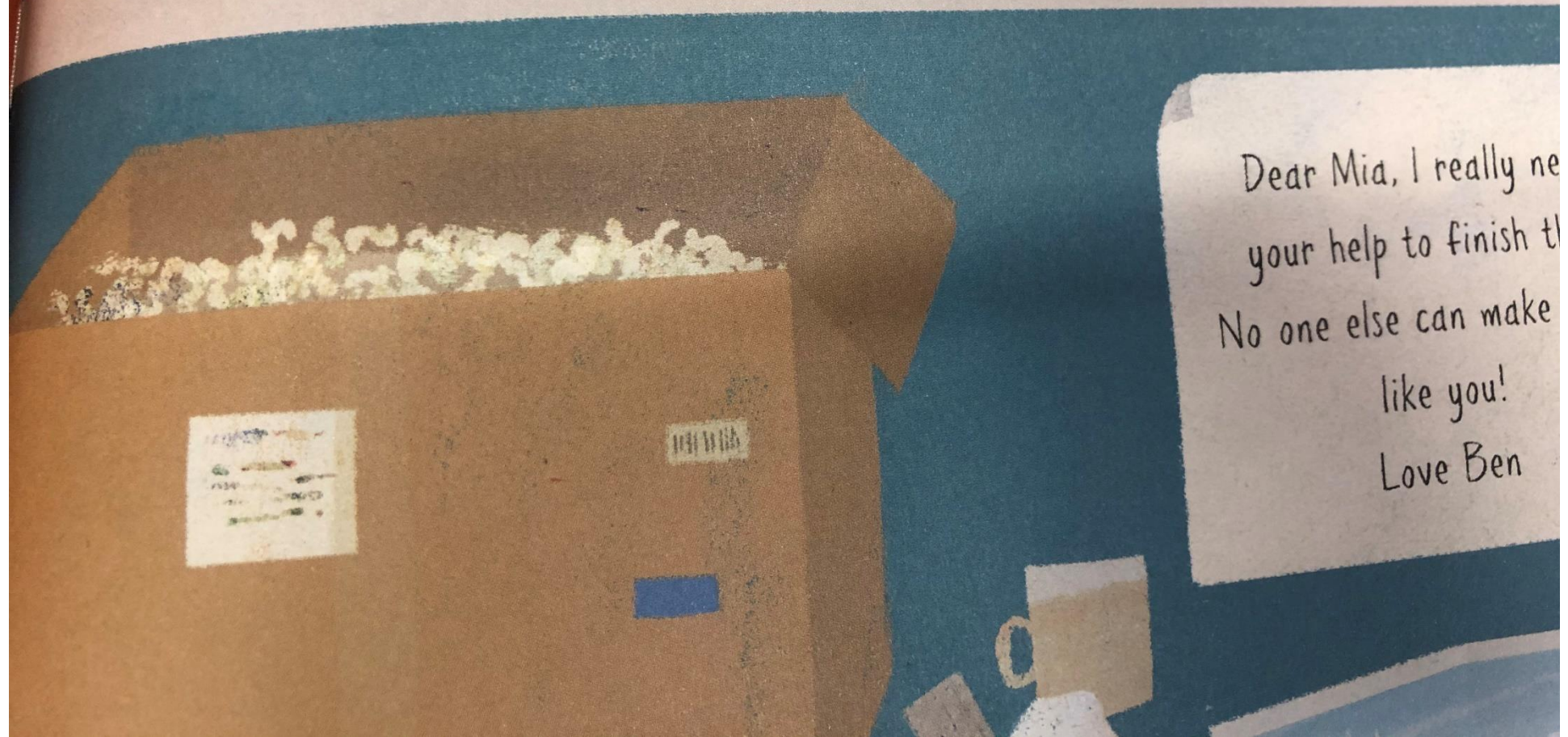
And in the beat of a wing . . .

There was also a note, which read:



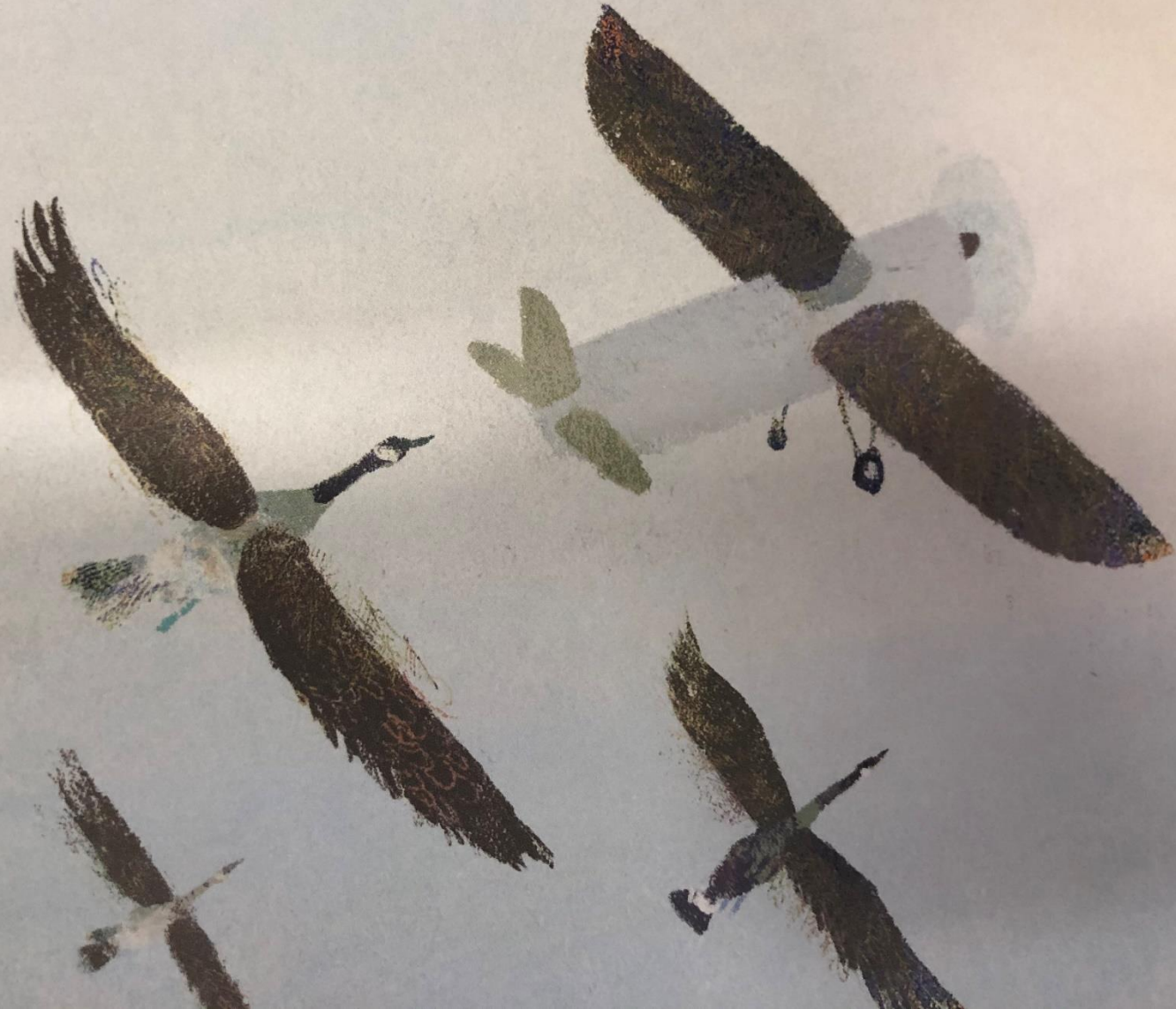
Dear Mia, I really need

like you!


