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

# <u>Literacy</u> All written activities have the star challenge 🜟







- Write a story about one of the other sea creatures shown in the illustrations. Could you write a story about one of Tiddler's school friends?
- Write a story about Tiddler riding somewhere on a seahorse. Where does he go to? What happens there?
- Make up another 'tall tale' that Tiddler might tell. How would he explain this to his teacher?
- What lessons might the fish have at their school? Write a list of lessons.
- At nine o'clock on Wednesday, Tiddler was 'dawdling'. What does this mean?
- Make a missing poster for Tiddler. Include a drawing of Tiddler and use your best describing words to write about him.
- A 'shoal' is the collective noun for a group of fish. Can you find out other collective nouns?

### Maths

• Can you make a number line of fish? Write a number on each fish and then put them in order.

★ 1-10 ★★ 1-15 ★★ 1-20 and over

• Can you make different sized fish and order them? What is the longest fish you can make? The shortest?

• Use your fish to create subtraction and addition problems. E.g. there are 7 fish swimming in the sea and 2 go riding on a seahorse. How many are left?

 $\bigstar$  Stay within 10  $\bigstar$  Stay below 15  $\bigstar$  Stay below 20

- Explore capacity. Fill up a big bowl of water and use different containers to fill and pour. Can you explain what full, half full, empty means? How many of your smallest container does it take to fill the largest? Guess then check.
- Make a fishing game. Use your number line fish or make some more. Slip a paper clip on them, or a staple (something metal) then use a magnet to pick them up. Which number did you get?
   Or you could add a little hook to them and create a rod to pick them up.
- Flappy fish races. Make fish out of paper and waft some more paper or card at them. They
  should move using the air from the waft. Can you have a race? Order them using first, second,
  third....

# Understanding our World

Being generous is a conscious decision from the heart to do something with what you have. Christians believe that God calls his people to be generous with what he has given to them. It is a sign of trust in God, that there will be enough for everyone, so share it. Being generous isn't always about money, we can be generous in so many other practical ways.

## Have you ever stopped to think about how generous the world around us is?

Christians believe this is a sign of God's generosity! Fruit, flowers, water, sunlight, crops, fish, weather, birds and animals.

**Could you create a generosity tree**? Can you decorate it with symbols of generosity? I wonder what these would look like. You can draw around your hands if you don't have any paint at home.

Think about all of the people you care about and then reflect on how you could be generous to each of those people.

Keep the tree up as a reminder to be generous.
