

THE RIVER NILE



> The Nile is the world's longest river. The Nile starts as two rivers called the 'White Nile' and the 'Blue Nile'. The two rivers meet near Sudan's capital city, Khartoum.

The Nile passes through 10 African countries in total. Lots of animals live in or by the river, including turtles, hippos and even the Nile crocodile.

> The Pyramids of Meroe in Sudan are the ancient tombs of the kings and queens of Kush.

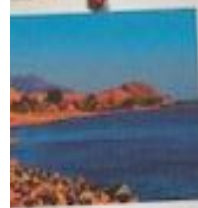

THE RED SEA



> The Red Sea is actually blue-green most of the time. It gets its name from plant-like algae that lives in the sea. When it dies, the algae turns the water reddish-brown.

Over 300 species of coral and 1,200 species of fish live in the Red Sea. Many of these creatures can't be found anywhere else in the world.
