



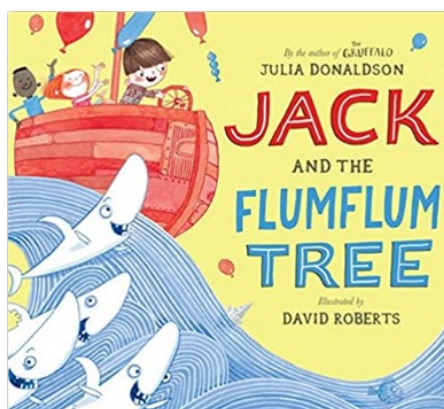

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Literacy All written activities have the star challenge



- Jack, Rose and Stu sail away to Blowyernose. Pretend that you've gone with them on the adventure. Design and write a postcard to send to Granny to tell her all about the Isle of Blowyernose.
- Write a list of things that you would put in your patchwork sack if you went on the adventure.
- The Isle of Blowyernose is an imaginary island can you create a new island. What is it called? What does it look like? What is there? What can you hear? Smell? Write a description of your island.
- If you could go on an adventure where would you go to? How would you get there? What would you do when you get there?
- Create a new version of the story...

First think about what you would use cure granny's moosles. What type of tree? Create a new one a bamboozle tree? A flowerlight tree? Use your imagination!

Then think about where it is from. You could use the island you have already created or it could be somewhere else, somewhere real or imaginary.

What do you take with you in your patchwork sack?

How are you going to get there? On a rocket? Boat? Bike or a flying car?

What happens when you get there? Does something take it from you? How do you get it back?

When you get home, is granny cured or not?

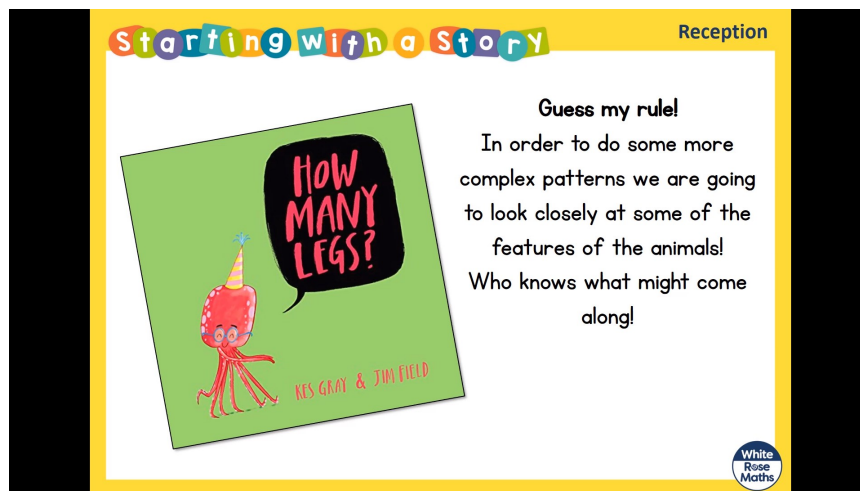
Maths

Getting Creative

- You could make a patchwork sack. Either with scraps of material or different pieces of paper fixed together into a sack.
- Make a patchwork picture. Mark out the same shape over and over again onto a piece of paper. Decorate each shape in a different way. You could stick to a colour theme or make a rainbow patchwork.
- Make a Tom-Tom drum. You could experiment with different grains, pulses, rocks inside different containers. Can you tap a simple rhythm?
- Look through the pages of the book to find the small hidden newspaper boat. This video tutorial demonstrates how to make a boat using an A4 piece of paper. <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=hiAWx8odStA>
- Jack and his friends use a map to help them find the Isle of Blowyernose. Make a map of your neighbourhood.
- Play the memory game when Granny went to market she bought, but with the patchwork sack. 1st person -In my patchwork sack I would put a net, 2nd person- In my patchwork sack I would put a net and a light. Keep adding things until someone forgets the list!



- The flumflum tree only grows on the far away Isle of Blowyernose. Talk about different climates and what different plants need to grow. Think about plants you can grow and grow your very own 'flumflum' tree.
- Jack used everyday objects in original and unusual ways! Have a 3 objects i.e a hairclip, an apple, a piece of paper. Can the children think of some other uses for these objects?
- Set up a boat using cushions, a broomstick for a mast and an old sheet cut into a triangle for a sail-play boats!
- Set up a play hospital and provide toy doctors kit, some dolls or stuffed animals in boxes for beds
- Play a memory game with the objects placed into a patchwork sack or bag! Set them out on the floor then give the children some time to study them, then while they are not looking, take one away. Can they guess which one is missing?!
